



WEEK THREE: WE GO

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What is “church”? As we continue through the book of Acts, we see people respond to the Holy Spirit. Last week, we learned that *we tell* others about what we have experienced and *we count* what God has done. This week we will learn that *we go*—because we’ve been commanded to go with what we’ve been given.

Where Am I Today?

- 1) The word “go” means to move, proceed or make progress. What are some areas in your life where you live in denial, hesitate, procrastinate, or fail to move forward at all?

Into the Bible

- 2) **Read** Acts 10 where Peter was called to do something he had never done before—tell a foreigner about Jesus. Why was his obedience so critical and such a privilege?
- 3) **Read** the following passages where people are told to “go.” The actions, reasons, and places God tells us to go are different, but we’re all called to go—to move forward in some area. What are the specific and unique actions these people are asked to take?
 - a. Genesis 12:1-5
 - b. Matthew 25:35-40



c. Matthew 28:16-20

d. John 8:1-11

e. Acts 1:8

f. Acts 16:6-10

How Does This Apply?

4) How do the calls to "go" in the passages above relate to your unique call to "go?"

5) What is your very next step of action?

6) How can you begin to see this as a privilege, and not a burden?

7) **Read** Isaiah 6:1-8. Focus on verse 8. Will you respond to God this way?

8) For your own self-examination (not group discussion), which areas must you immediately work on to be able to "go" for Jesus: prayer, prejudice, pride, procrastination, pay the price (generosity).



Digging Deeper: Going Further on Your Own

- 9) The conversion of Cornelius in Acts 10 illustrates *who* is responsible for evangelism. According to the Joshua Project, there are still 6,890 people groups that have not been reached for the gospel. Some may hope that God will intervene miraculously and send an angel to tell people about Jesus, like He did with Cornelius. This may happen, but look closely at Cornelius' story. What did the angel tell him? What did the angel *not* tell Cornelius? What was Peter's responsibility? What does this tell us about our own responsibilities?
